You'll learn how AI tools can create increasingly realistic images, audio, and social media posts and explore how AI-generated media could be used to undermine the democratic process, manipulate voter behaviour and distort public opinion. However, don't worry, this session isn't just about politics; it's about protecting your digital wellbeing. You'll learn how these tools can be used to create other misleading content that could influence your online life and the decisions you make every day. No technical knowledge is needed to take part. By learning how to spot AI generated content, you can help stop the spread of harmful online misinformation.
