# Women in Scotland 1900-2020: Workplace Struggles Project

We are pleased to announce the launch of a new project in March 2021 that will seek to develop and collate accessible learning materials in relation to Women and Workplace Struggles in Scotland since the 1900s. Women have long played a central role. indeed a leading role, in many workplace-based strikes, disputes and trade union struggles. Sadly, much of this history has not been recorded. However, in recent decades this has become more pronounced, not least but not only in public sector employment. Equal pay disputes, conflict around regrading, service reductions and redundancies, together with struggles to improve pay and conditions, have been part and parcel of the Scottish public sector landscape since the 1990s. Along with disputes in the private sector, there is a rich history to be uncovered, recorded and shared, which will enhance our existing knowledge of Scottish history as well as providing a freely accessible resource for future generations of trade unionists. workers, researchers and activists, as well as Scottish society more widely.

The key aims of this project are to:

- Capture both historic and more recent disputes and struggles through interviews, archival research, oral history, focus group and discussion meetings.
- Collate contributions written by those involved in disputes with diaries, images, posters, flyers, audio and video recordings.
- Develop learning materials for the future generations of historians, researchers, activists, trade union members and groups of workers more generally.
- Publish learning materials on the Open University's OpenLearn platform.
